KEY DEVELOPMENTS

Maduro Regime Harassment of NGOs in Venezuela Threatens Aid Activities

During late November, officials from the regime of Venezuela's Nicolás Maduro committed several acts of intimidation and harassment against humanitarian non-governmental organizations (NGOs) operating in Venezuela, relief actors report. On November 20, the Superintendencia de las Instituciones del Sector Bancario de Venezuela (Sudeban)—a banking authority affiliated with the Maduro regime—directed all banks in Venezuela to strengthen monitoring of NGO operations in the country to detect potential illicit activity. Following the issuance of the directive, as of late November some NGOs reported their bank accounts had been frozen, local media report. Subsequently, on November 24, Maduro regime-affiliated security personnel conducted unannounced visits to the offices of two NGOs, taking information regarding the organizations' activities and staff. In response, two national NGOs affected by the incidents released a joint statement expressing concern regarding recent Maduro regime-linked harassment efforts targeting their organizations. One of the NGOs also highlighted the risk such efforts pose to the continuation of their activities in Venezuela, which provide daily food assistance to approximately 25,000 people in the country. The U.S. Government (USG) continues to coordinate with the UN and other humanitarian donors to advocate for the protection of relief organizations and activities in Venezuela.

R4V Releases 2021 RMRP, Highlighting Increased Needs Due to Ongoing Health and Economic Crises

On December 10, the Regional Interagency Coordination Platform for Refugees from Venezuela (R4V)—led by the International Organization for Migration (IOM) and the Office of the UN High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR)—released the 2021 Regional Refugee and Migrant Response Plan for Refugees and Migrants from Venezuela (RMRP). The plan requests \$1.4 billion to provide humanitarian assistance to approximately 3.3 million crisis-affected individuals—including Venezuelan refugees and migrants, as well as host community members—across Latin America and the Caribbean (LAC). Overall, the RMRP estimates that approximately 7.2 million people will require humanitarian assistance due to the Venezuela regional crisis in 2021, representing a 10 percent increase compared with the estimated 6.5 million people in need in 2020. The plan utilizes several assumptions to inform projected needs for 2021, including continued population outflow from Venezuela, albeit likely at a lower rate; a rise in irregular migration among Venezuelans and associated protection risks; and a continuation of needs exceeding host countries' response capacities. The RMRP also highlights the adverse effects of the humanitarian crisis on girls and women and rising xenophobia in host countries. To date, the USG has provided more than \$850 million in humanitarian assistance to support Venezuelan refugees and migrants, as well as host community members, affected by the crisis across LAC.

Relief Actors Address Increased Needs Along Colombia's Caminantes Route

Since early October, when COVID-19-related mobility restrictions began to ease across the region, relief actors have reported increased migration from Venezuela to neighboring countries, particularly Colombia. Since mid-November, humanitarian organizations have reported large numbers of migrants entering Colombia via *trochas*—or informal crossing points—and are working with local authorities to respond to emergency needs among the migrant population, which includes vulnerable groups such as older people, pregnant and lactating women, and unaccompanied minors. Migración Colombia—the customs and migration authority of the Government of Colombia—anticipates an influx of approximately 300,000 people from Venezuela from January to March 2021.

On November 14, a USAID/BHA-contracted field monitor traveled from Cúcuta city in Colombia's Norte de Santander Department to Santander Department's Bucaramanga city to observe humanitarian conditions and service provision at sites along the approximately 120-mile route, which is often traveled by caminantes—or populations walking from Venezuela to other countries across the region. While no services were available between Norte de Santander's Bochalema and Pamplona municipalities, a distance of approximately 20 miles, several facilities—including some operated by USAID/BHA partners—in key locations along the caminantes route are operational, providing hot meals, health screenings, and hygiene supplies to migrants. For example, USAID/BHA partner Solidarités International is providing boxed ready-to-eat meals at one migrant refuge site; in addition, with USAID/BHA support, Solidarités International is improving water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH) infrastructure; facilitating the delivery of basic health care and medical commodities; and distributing kits containing hygiene supplies to shelters and migrant assistance centers between Cúcuta and Bucaramanga.

Fuel Shortages, Regime Impediments Complicate Humanitarian Access in Venezuela

Worsening fuel shortages since September and COVID-19-related movement restrictions have hampered humanitarian access, exacerbated food insecurity, and limited beneficiaries' access to humanitarian assistance in Venezuela, relief actors report. Fuel scarcity has also contributed to power outages and water shortages that have limited health center operations, prompting delays in service delivery. In addition, a lack of clarity surrounding the Maduro regime's current entry restrictions, as well as delays in granting visas and work permits for foreign NGO staff, continue to impede humanitarian operations in Venezuela. In late November, Médecins Sans Frontières (MSF) reported that persistent challenges to acquiring entry and work permits for international staff had hindered the organization's ability to provide health care commensurate with its standards, prompting the international NGO to announce a gradual withdrawal of its staff from Ana Francisca Pérez de León II hospital in Venezuela's capital city of Caracas. MSF had been supporting COVID-19 response efforts at the hospital since March. USAID/BHA and State/PRM continue to coordinate with international donors, NGOs, and UN agencies to advocate for improved humanitarian access in Venezuela.

FOOD SECURITY

USAID/BHA assistance aims to address acute food insecurity among migrants, refugees, and host community members residing in Brazil, Colombia, Ecuador, and Peru, as well as vulnerable Venezuelans inside Venezuela. USAID/BHA-funded emergency food assistance—implemented through seven NGO partners across the region, as well as the UN World Food Program (WFP) in Colombia, Ecuador, and Peru—includes locally procured in-kind food assistance, cash transfers for food, food vouchers redeemable in local markets, and complementary nutrition and WASH support. In total, these programs aim to reach approximately 1.9 million people in Brazil, Colombia, Ecuador, and Peru, and more than 60,000 people in Venezuela. USAID/BHA also contributes to coordination and capacity-building activities for food security actors that aim to improve the quality of humanitarian programming for the Venezuela regional crisis.

HEALTH

USAID/BHA and State/PRM support five UN agencies and I7 NGOs to provide life-saving health care services to vulnerable Venezuelans and host community members across LAC. USAID/BHA funding enables partners to distribute medical supplies, support service provision at health facilities, and train community health workers to address urgent health needs. Additionally, State/PRM partners—including the International Federation of the Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies (IFRC), UNHCR, and II NGOs—support essential health interventions for Venezuelans residing in Brazil, Colombia, Ecuador, and Peru. With FY 2020 funding, State/PRM NGO partners together aim to provide more than 55,000 beneficiaries with improved access to health care services. USAID/BHA also supports activities that provide personal protective equipment and train local health care workers to respond to cases of COVID-19 in Venezuela.

WASH

USAID/BHA and State/PRM support WASH programming to address the needs of vulnerable Venezuelan households residing throughout LAC to prevent the spread of COVID-19 and other communicable diseases, as well as acute malnutrition among children and mothers. State/PRM partners implement WASH activities that assist Venezuelans residing outside Venezuela, including WASH measures to mitigate the risk of COVID-19 infection among nearly 1,000 indigenous Venezuelans in Brazil's Amazonas and Roraima states. In addition, through partnerships with various relief agencies, USAID/BHA supports the implementation of critical WASH activities inside Venezuela, including conducting hygiene awareness sessions, rehabilitating water systems, and providing safe drinking water to approximately 1.2 million people in need.

ECONOMIC RECOVERY AND CASH ASSISTANCE

The USG supports 18 partners to provide multipurpose cash assistance (MPCA) and livelihood recovery programs to vulnerable Venezuelans, helping people meet immediate needs while also supporting local markets. With USAID/BHA and State/PRM support, MPCA and economic recovery programs aim to increase the purchasing power and restore the livelihood security of vulnerable Venezuelan households. With more than \$84.9 million in dedicated FY 2020 funding for MPCA in Colombia and Peru, USAID/BHA partners distribute cash assistance through prepaid debit cards and money transfers to vulnerable households. MPCA transfers enable recipients to prioritize needs such as food, health care, essential household items, school supplies, and shelter, as well as provide a means to pursue income-generating opportunities. State/PRM partners in Brazil, Colombia, Ecuador, and Peru support economic recovery by strengthening livelihood opportunities and socioeconomic integration among vulnerable Venezuelans, providing training and resources to enable the adoption of sustainable entrepreneurship and employment strategies. State/PRM partners provide Venezuelans with registration and technical assistance for work permits;

employment and vocational training; language training; technical skills certifications; business development training; and the provision of seed capital and cash assistance via bank transfers, prepaid cards, and mobile money platforms.

PROTECTION

The USG supports 29 partners to address protection concerns among more than 747,800 vulnerable Venezuelans residing in Venezuela and across the region, particularly along the Colombia–Venezuela border. USG-supported protection activities aim to increase access to and support the provision of protection services, including gender-based violence (GBV) prevention and case management, child-friendly spaces, community-based mental health and psychosocial support, and legal assistance. USG partners also work with the broader humanitarian community across LAC to support advocacy efforts with authorities and promote the delivery of protection services in areas with significant humanitarian access constraints.

CONTEXT IN BRIEF

- Deteriorating economic and political conditions—characterized by hyperinflation—in the Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela have decreased households' access to food, medicine, and health care; contributed to increasing humanitarian needs; and triggered an influx of Venezuelans into countries across LAC, primarily to Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Ecuador, and Peru. By November 2020, approximately 5.4 million Venezuelans were living outside of Venezuela.
- The population influx has increased in recent years and is straining available services, especially in border areas of Brazil, Colombia, Ecuador, and Peru. Recent assessments indicate that food, health care, and WASH support are among the most urgent humanitarian needs among vulnerable populations, including Venezuelans, Colombian returnees from Venezuela, and host communities in border regions. The outflow of people from Venezuela also contributes to increased public health concerns throughout the region, particularly with regard to overburdened health care systems and the spread of COVID-19, as well as other infectious diseases.
- In addition to supporting ongoing regional response activities, USAID/BHA and State/PRM staff members based throughout the region and in Washington, D.C., are monitoring the humanitarian situation in close coordination with relevant host governments, donor governments, NGOs, and UN counterparts.
