UGANDA: INCREASING ACCESS TO INFORMATION DURING THE COVID-19 CRISIS

In northern Uganda, one <u>Cooperative Development Program</u> (CDP) partner is supporting health care workers responding to COVID-19 in an innovative way. "People in our communities ask lots of questions that at times we can't answer, because this whole situation is new to us and we have not yet gathered enough convincing information to give them back," noted Margaret, a health care provider in northern Uganda. To address this, <u>HealthPartners</u>, a U.S.-based health cooperative supported by USAID's CDP, launched a two-way text-messaging campaign. More than 1,000 recipients receive Ministry of Health-approved information on symptoms, prevention measures, and what to do if someone falls ill - all in local languages. The cooperative is also printing informational posters for health facilities and hosting radio shows with health officials and local leaders to debunk the myths and rumors surrounding COVID-19. The USAID-supported campaign enables the cooperative's staff to provide support, accurate information, encouragement, and empathy to its broad network. As Margaret boldly commented, "It will allow us to push further!"




PHILIPPINES: SUPPORTING COOPERATIVES IN RESPONSE TO COVID-19

Through the Local Works program, USAID/Philippines launched "Generating Rural Opportunities by Working with Cooperatives" (GROW-Coop) to build the capacity of agriculture cooperatives. In light of the current emergency situation, food distribution and access have been severely disrupted. Farmer producers in the provinces cannot sell their products, while consumers in key cities are having a hard time getting enough food supplies. To address this, GROW-Coop and GROW-Coop implementing partner Agriterra are working with cooperatives to encourage "coop to coop" trade. By connecting cooperatives, as well as relevant civil society organizations, GROW-Coop and Agriterra are supporting solutions that will ensure the supply and sale of food products continues. This past week, the pilot program enabled 1.6 metric tons of fresh produce from a cooperative in the northern part of the country to reach the largest agriculture cooperative in the country, located in just South of Metro Manila, the country's capital - thus supporting the livelihoods of farmers, while also making fresh and cheaper produce available to the 39,000 cooperative members. More farmer cooperatives and consumers are expected to benefit from

these trading mechanisms in the coming weeks and months. Learn more.



DOMINICAN REPUBLIC AND HAITI: CONVENING BOTH SIDES OF THE BORDER TO IMPROVE WATER ACCESS

In the Dominican Republic, communities on the border with Haiti lack access to clean water for household consumption and adequate water for agricultural production. Deforestation and contaminating activities on both sides of the border make management of the watershed difficult. The Local Works team convened community members, local non-government organizations (NGOs), and local government ministers for a two-day "Whole System in a Room" (WSR) workshop, in which actors collectively envisioned a future with clean water resources. WSR is a locally led experience in which diverse actors with a shared problem undertake a facilitated journey to understand the past, focus on the present, envision the future, find common ground, and develop action plans to drive change in the system. Featuring spirited skits and original

songs, the workshop ended with enthusiasm around locally designed plans of action.

Zambia: Learning the Art of Beekeping

The Office of Local Sustainability (E3/LS) salutes Peace Corps Volunteers who were evacuated from their posts in March due to the COVID-19 pandemic. In honor of World Bee Day (May 20), E3/LS is pleased to showcase a completed USAID-Peace Corps Small Project Assistance (SPA) Program project from Zambia. This SPA project supported beekeeping training for youth in a rural community of the Mufumbwe district. The goal was to build skills in beekeeping (a lucrative enterprise in high demand), boost entrepreneurship, and empower young people to protect the environment. Through SPA, the Mufumbwe Youth Resource Center taught 25 students - who then went on to train an additional 175 farmers - in the art of beekeeping. The community, in turn, contributed the venue for the training and meals for the trainees and staff. Want to learn more? Check out this manual on training small-scale beekeepers.

Bangladesh: Restoring the Environment and Building Local Capacity

In Cox's Bazar, the influx of nearly one million refugees from the Rohingya humanitarian crisis into already impoverished communities has led to a complex emergency. This has depleted environmental resources both inside and outside of refugee camps, impacting the

communities that depend on these resources for their livelihoods. Through Local Works, USAID/Bangladesh is working with local organizations and community management groups to address this issue. Three new activities implemented by Arannayk Foundation, Community Development Centre, and Nature Conservation Management will support reforestation and conservation efforts - targeting 1,800-3,000 resource-dependent households each. This work will also build the capacity of local communities and organizations, with technical training in farming, savings, and more for community members, and resource mobilization support for community-based organizations.

COVID-19: Examining the Impact on Civil Society Organizations

LINC, a former E3/LS <u>co-created research</u> <u>initiatives</u> partner, conducted a survey of civil society organizations (CSOs) across Asia, Africa, Latin America, and Southeastern Europe on the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic. Every CSO surveyed had been negatively affected in some way. Funding is the primary challenge: nearly half of CSOs surveyed (even well-established organizations) reported they would have to close within three months without additional funding. At the same time, nearly 65% of CSOs surveyed reported undertaking activities in direct response to the pandemic. The report



also offers insights from CSOs into how best to support them in times of crisis. Read the report.

Meeting with the Modernizing Foreign Assistance Network on Civil Society

Last week, USAID and the <u>Modernizing Foreign Assistance Network</u> (MFAN) held a virtual meeting. MFAN shared <u>recommendations</u> with USAID on developing an Agency-wide strategy for engaging with civil society in partner countries. MFAN highlighted <u>Local Works</u> and the <u>New</u> <u>Partnerships Initiative</u> as two positive examples of how USAID is already doing this work well. E3/LS welcomed MFAN's strong focus on elevating local civil society as a core element of the <u>Journey to Self-Reliance</u> - and emphasized the importance of empowering local civil society to address local development challenges.
