NORTH MACEDONIA: EVALUATING THE SMALL PROJECT ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

USAID/North Macedonia and Peace Corps/North Macedonia conducted an evaluation of their <u>Small Project Assistance</u> (SPA) Program. By using a local youth network for the evaluation, they ended up with a cost-effective (as well as highly insightful) final product.

In line with the <u>global SPA evaluation</u>, this report provides more evidence on the effectiveness of community-led development: more than 95% of the projects were completed, while 70% were fully sustained by the community - and 25% were *expanded* upon by the community. GUATEMALA: INCREASING ACCESS TO FINANCE FOR LOCAL BUSINESSES

Under USAID's <u>Cooperative Development Program</u> (CDP), the <u>World Council of Credit Unions</u> (WOCCU) is introducing new methods to increase financial inclusion and build the capacity of credit unions and national associations in Guatemala. Guatemalan credit unions face a unique challenge: they are legally prohibited from lending to registered businesses. Consequently, there is an \$18 billion dollar gap in financing to small and medium enterprises. Through the CDP, WOCCU is developing a credit union service organization, or CUSO, to lend directly to local businesses. Leveraging the national credit union's network of more than 1.5 million members,

this new entity will expand access to finance and business development services across Guatemala. Why credit unions? Learn more.



Cambodia: Building Capacity for Community Health

In Cambodia, a <u>Small Project Assistance</u> (SPA) Program project is supporting better hygiene and sanitation by training midwives, health center staff, and village health volunteers. The project, "Scrub to Shine," started with monthly outreach events - with health center staff showing more than 400 patients and members of their family proper handwashing and hygienic practices. Then, village health volunteers from the original project expanded their efforts by training neighboring communities - 11 villages in total - in how to implement their own version of the

Dominican Republic: Mapping Donor Activities

Through Local Works, USAID/Dominican Republic is working with the government-run Border Observatory to support development in the Dominican Republic-Haiti border region. Following an initial donor coordination workshop convened by USAID, the Border Observatory created a report mapping regional investments by donors and other groups and identifying recommendations for collaboration. The report has been shared widely and will serve as the groundwork for future donor coordination and a joint action proposal to benefit the border region.

Co-Created Research Initiatives: Closing a Feedback Loop
